The central California coast has been designated as a national marine sanctuary because its unique biological, geological, and oceanographic features make it one of the richest marine environments in the world. On any given day you can enjoy unsurpassed wildlife viewing. Whales, sea otters, pelicans, sea lions and seals abound on the Santa Cruz County coast. The Sanctuary

runs along one fourth of the California coastline – from Cambria to just north of the Golden Gate Bridge. It is the third largest marine protected area in the world, and as large as the state of

Connecticut. The Sanctuary protects a diversity of habitats, including wave-swept beaches, lush kelp forests, and the unique Monterey Submarine Canyon, which meanders over 60 miles of seafloor and descends two miles into the oceanic abyss. The National Marine Sanctuary Program, operated by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), promotes environmental stewardship and protection of our ocean resources. Harmful activities such as oil drilling and ocean dumping are prohibited in the Sanctuary. Other activities, including fishing, boating, and diving, are allowed. We are able to enjoy a clean and beautiful marine sanctuary thanks to the many individuals – both residents and visitors – who care for it and use it wisely. Together we can continue to protect this national treasure. Please:

- Stay 50 feet away from all marine mammals (including seals, sea lions, & sea otters). Observe without disturbing them.
- ★ Do not remove animals from beaches or tide pools. Leave them in their natural habitat.
- ★ Instead of driving around town, walk or ride a bike. Reduce water pollution—& use less gas.
- ★ Pick up your trash and do your part to keep our Sanctuary clean.
- ★ Explore and share the wonder!
