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2. Spencer Hughes – junior in speech communication and political science. Serves on GSB since September 2010. Currently serves as Director of Student Affairs on the GSB Cabinet. Previous experience: Speaker of the Senate and Vice Speaker of the Senate, Chair of the Rules Committee, Vice Chair of the University Affairs, Rules, and Public Relations Committees.
 3. Hilary Kletscher – sophomore in biological systems engineering. Currently serves as a senator representing the College of Engineering.
 4. Main Points:
 - a. Increasing transparency – Twitter/FB/online presence. Before money spent student can see how money is spent
 - b. Executive payments – 3 positions are paid that come from student fees. These payments are expensive, redirect money towards allocations
 - c. GPSS relationships – change the ratio so more money is given to GPSS
- ii. Daniel Rediske (President) and Zach Bauer (Vice President)

 2. Daniel Rediske – junior in computer science and political science. Serves on GSB since his freshman year. Previous experience: GSB Finance Committee, CyRide Board of Trustees, Ames Metropolitan Planning Organization.
 3. Zach Bauer – sophomore in journalism and political science. Currently serves as a senator for the Inter-Residence Hall Association and as chair of the Public Relations committee.
 4. Main Points:
 - a. GSB is doing ok, can serve better. We are not in touch with the graduate students
 - b. Communication – currently there is a lack of internal/external communication; increase communication between branches
 - c. Projects – strengthening the relationship; GPSS better understands graduate life; we need to strengthen connections; we need a stronger partnership not only between execs, but between whole senate;
- iii. Open Forum
1. What is your take on 50/50 ratio?
 - a. Rediske – I was behind 50/50. I am looking forward to investigate GPSS/GSB ratio in more detail
 - b. Hughes – Hillary supported 60/40. We support and ready to move forward with 60/40 ratio next year
 2. Is there any initiative/plan to collect feedback from all students?
 - a. Rediske – I am doing as much as possible within my network; but first we need to resolve our internal communication and establish a closer relationship with GPSS

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- 1 b. Hughes – take advantage of social media; receive feedback
2 from everyone, we need to go to the students
- 3 3. There appears some disconnect between GSB and GPSS. GSB
4 seemed to be more focused on numbers rather than how GPSS can
5 benefit graduate students.
 - 6 a. Hughes – I am in favor of eliminating requirements for GSB
7 Senator at large, the only voices that were heard were of
8 undergraduate students during 50/50 ratio discussion
 - 9 b. Rediske – never heard of GSB Senator-at-large eliminating
10 requirements. I agree we need to establish a consistent
11 relationship through minimizing requirements
- 12 4. How is graduate 60% is being spent? How are you spending our
13 money without our input?
 - 14 a. Rediske – we need a stronger relationship between two
15 bodies. 90% of student fees goes to allocations; the rest goes
16 to legal services and other campus services.
 - 17 b. Hughes – we need to make it easier for graduate students to
18 be present at GSB meetings so the voice of graduate students
19 is heard when the issues are discussed.
- 20 5. Grad student organizations whose mission consistent with an
21 academic department and/or receives funding from an academic
22 department or college cannot be funded by GSB so lots of GPSS
23 constituents are not represented by GSB.
 - 24 a. Rediske – GSB documents are not very transparent;
 - 25 b. Senator Mukherjee – GSB does not fund clubs that are
26 associated with academic research. These policies restrict lots
27 of undergraduates from joining our graduate student
28 organizations
- 29 6. Reducing executive scholarships, wouldn't this reduce motivation?
 - 30 a. Rediske – there are a lot of unpaid positions; I suggest to pay
31 only tuition for 2 positions; ½ for VP, the rest of money
32 would go to the general pot for student orgs, events on-
33 campus;
 - 34 b. Hughes –half of the students manage to combine part-time
35 and GSB; student org need more money; we need to put
36 students first. It would also give us more money to fund
37 projects like NextBus. GSB Execs are here in the summer so
38 some stipend for summer would be beneficial. Rather than
39 paying a full scholarship, other options could be proposed
40 such as parking permit at MU.
- 41 7. How would you promote GSB-GPSS relationships?
 - 42 a. Rediske – meet together, have a common discussion on the
43 bigger level, not just execs; have presence in GPSS, sit in
44 your meetings, having GSB and GPSS presidents visiting
45 each other's senate only once a year is not enough

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- 1 b. Hughes - Representation structure is the best to fix it. We
- 2 need to focus more on how to keep Senators so once-a-week
- 3 interaction continues
- 4 8. Why not have a separate graduate government? Why GSB should
- 5 continue representing graduate students?
- 6 a. Hughes – it is beneficial to have one student body and one
- 7 president to represent all students; if we improve
- 8 representation, graduate voice will be included within GSB
- 9 b. Rediske – maybe this is a route to go; GSB is not solution to
- 10 everything; I can advocate your ideas but I may not fully
- 11 understand graduate life. I am open to this discussion
- 12 iv. Senator Pritchard
- 13 1. Graduate needs and reflections survey - how to enhance graduate
- 14 experience

IOWA STATE UNIVERSITY GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL STUDENT SENATE

CONSTITUTION

The Graduate and Professional Student Senate of Iowa State University is an elected body through which graduate and professional students express their concern for the welfare of graduate and professional students at the University, develop and disseminate ideas for the improvement of graduate and professional education, and contribute to the formation of relevant University policy. The Graduate and Professional Student Senate (GPSS) is the representative, deliberative, and administrative organization of the graduate and professional student body of Iowa State University, and is a duly constituted independent collegiate organization within the University.

ARTICLE I. THE GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL STUDENT SENATE

1. Representation. Each graduate department, interdepartmental, and professional program may elect one Senator for each fraction of one-hundred (100) graduate or professional students enrolled with a maximum of four (4) Senators per department, where enrollment in a department, interdepartmental and professional program major is defined at <http://www.registrar.iastate.edu/enrollment/statsmajor>
2. Eligibility. Any student enrolled at least halftime (unless fewer credits are required in the final stages of their degree as defined by the Continuous Registration Requirement) in a graduate department, interdepartmental, or professional program at Iowa State University may be elected as a Senator. Each graduate/professional program may create more restrictive rules for electing Senators if they choose. Iowa State University and the GPSS do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, age, ethnicity, religion, national origin, pregnancy, sexual orientation, gender identity, genetic information, sex, marital status, disability, or status as a U.S. veteran.
3. Definitions
 - i. Senators. A Senator is an elected representative registered in good standing with the Graduate College or any of the professional colleges within the University. Each Senator will have one vote in the Senate.
 - ii. Senators-at-large. The following positions carry the status of Senator-at-large. Status as a Senator-at-large shall not count against a departmental quota (ARTICLE 1, section 1,

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1 representation), and is not subject to departmental election procedures as otherwise defined in
2 the By-laws or the Standing Rules.

3 a. Officers of the Senate. The Officers of the Senate shall represent the Senate as a whole and
4 shall not carry a vote.

5 b. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall represent the Senate as a whole. The Vice-President
6 shall only vote in the occurrence of a tie.

7 c. Graduate GSB Senators. They shall represent the graduate student body as a whole. They shall
8 also act as a liaison between GSB and GPSS to facilitate efficient and productive legislation by
9 the two bodies and to strengthen representation of student concerns to administration. GSB
10 Senators who represent the Graduate College shall be elected to GSB by the graduate student
11 body or, in the case of a vacancy or special circumstances, appointed to GSB by GPSS as
12 defined in the GSB Constitution and By-Laws

13 iii. Session. A scheduled meeting of the seated Senate.

14
15 4. Terms. Members of the Senate are elected by graduate or professional students for one year terms
16 that begin in August or January and may be re-elected for as long as they continue to be in good
17 standing with the Graduate College or College of Veterinary Medicine.

18
19 5. Officers. The officers of the Senate are the President, Vice-President, Chief Information Officer,
20 Treasurer, University Relations and Legislative Affairs Chair, and Professional Advancement Grant
21 Chair. Henceforth, this order shall be known as the order of seniority.

22
23
24 6. Sessions.

25
26 i. The Graduate and Professional Student Senate meets once per month during the fall and spring
27 semesters, except in the months of December and May. Summer sessions may be held at the
28 discretion of the Executive Council for Senators who are in place and present at Iowa State
29 University.

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31 ii. The Vice-President shall call additional sessions as directed by the Senate or a written petition of 30% of the
32 Senate

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35 7. Powers and Duties.

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37 i. The Senate may discuss and take a position on any subject of concern to the graduate and
38 professional student body. The Senate may discuss and make policies within its jurisdiction. The

1 Senate may also allocate funds by Senate Bill or through an approved budget. Allocation of funds
2 shall never exceed the actual funds possessed by the Senate.

3 ii. Issues must be referred to a vote of the graduate and professional student body upon receipt of a
4 petition of two percent (2%) of the graduate and professional student body (as determined by the
5 Office of the Registrar), or may be referred by the Senate. The vote shall be through a process
6 approved by the Senate and the voting process shall be open for not less than one regular class
7 day (9am to 5pm).
8

9 iii. The Senate may call general meetings of the graduate and professional student body.
10

11 iv. The Senate is the judge of its membership.
12

13 v. The existence of the Senate shall not preclude other means of communication between the
14 graduate or professional student and the University.
15

16 ARTICLE II. THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

17

18 1. Membership. The Executive Council consists of the Senate officers.
19

20 2. The duties and responsibilities of the officers shall be defined and be limited to:
21

22 i. President:

23 a. Preside over the GPSS Executive Council meetings.

24 b. Preside over any general meetings of the graduate and professional student body.

25 c. Supervise normal internal operations of the Senate.

26 d. Attend annual President's training in compliance with Student Organization regulations.

27 e. Coordinate and direct the activities of the operating committees as defined in article III.

28 f. Assume risk management officer responsibilities for acts of the organizations or events
29 produced by the organization.

30 1. The role of risk management officer is [a] to recommend risk management policies or

- 5 f. Reserve monthly meeting venue through university's room reservation request.

7 iii. Chief Information Officer:

- 8 a. Record and file records of activities of the Senate and its agencies.
- 9 b. Keep a record of attendance at Senate Sessions.
- 10 c. Handle and maintain a record of all Senate correspondence.

- 12 e. Maintain the GPSS webpage and email listservs.
- 13 f. Have a functional knowledge of GPSS rules and proceedings.
- 14 g. Chair the Elections Committee.

16 iv. Treasurer:

- 17 a. Collect, keep a record of, and arrange for the safekeeping of such monies as the Senate may obtain.

- 20 c. Report to the Senate for approval at all regular sessions, all income and expenses and maintain records of

- 32 a. Review and allocate professional advancement grants according to guidelines set by the Senate for GPSS
- 33 awards and scholarships.

35 3. Terms. The term of office for Executive Council members shall expire upon the adjournment of the

36 April session.

38 4. Eligibility. The Executive Council members are elected by and from the Senate.

40 i. All members of the current Senate are eligible to serve as Executive Council members.

42 ii. Members of the Executive Council or nominees to be elected to the Executive Council must meet

11 positions are filled. All questions regarding GPSS membership are directed to the Elections
12 Committee. The Chief Information Officer is the Chair of the Elections Committee, which:

14 b. Supervises special elections needed to fill vacancies.
15 c. Maintains a record of attendance at all Senate sessions and notifies Senators as well as their

- 31 v. **Professional Advancement Grant Committee. The Professional Advancement Grant Chair will**
32 **work with a representative from the Graduate College for travel awards, and form a committee to**
33 **review PGSS awards and scholarships.**

- 35 2. **Other Committees. The Senate may establish such other standing or ad hoc committees as its**
36 **business requires.**

- 17 2. Selection. The Adviser shall be selected through consultation between the President of the Senate, the
18 Office of the Senior-Vice President for Student Affairs and the Office of the Senior-Vice President and
19 Provost. A majority vote of the Senate shall be required to confirm the appointment of the Adviser.

- 21 3. Term. The term of the Adviser shall be ongoing until resignation or removal by a two-thirds vote of the
22 Senate. Selection of a new advisor shall proceed through procedures outlined in Article IV, paragraph
23 2.

25 ARTICLE V. SUPREMACY OF RULES

27 1. The following shall be the order of supremacy of rules and policies of the Graduate and Professional

5 and sign each expenditure before payment.

9 ARTICLE VII. BY-LAWS, AMENDMENTS, AND RATIFICATION

11 1. By-Laws. A set of By-Laws shall be written and maintained to specify the rules for elections and rules
12 of procedure for the Senate and the Executive Council. Amendments to the By-Laws shall require
13 approval from two-thirds of all Senators present, where those two-thirds are also a majority of all
14 Senators currently elected and verified.

16 2. Amendments. Amendments to the Constitution may be initiated by the Senate, or by a petition to the Senate of at
17 least one hundred (100) combined graduate and professional students. An amendment must be approved at two
18 senate sessions that are at least two weeks apart. At each senate session, approval must be by two-thirds of all
19 Senators present, where those two-thirds are also a majority of all Senators currently elected and verified.

21 3. Ratification. This Constitution shall be ratified upon approval of three-fourths of the Senate.

23 If the Constitution or By-Laws are amended, the Chief Information Officer shall send an updated copy of
24 both to the Student Activities Center within ten days of the amendment.

Cooperation

Between the Iowa State University Government of the Student Body (GSB) and the Graduate and Professional Student Senate (GPSS)

Preamble

GSB and GPSS have a special and unique relationship, supported by decades of history, which is different than the relationship between GSB and any other organization. This document has a primary status in the enumeration of the rights and responsibilities of the two governmental bodies, as well as codifying independent legitimate authority.

GSB is the only student government organization on campus which represents all students: undergraduate, non-traditional, graduate, and professional. Accordingly, GSB allocates student fees in a manner to benefit the student body as a whole, by funding such entities as the Daily, the Committee on Lectures, and Student Legal Services. GSB is also able to speak to the university administration and outside groups on behalf of the entire student body.

GPSS is the independent government body which handles matters of concern to graduate and professional students that fall outside of the scope of the GSB by-laws. Specifically, GPSS confronts issues of professional and academic advancement common to graduate and professional students such as the funding of travel grants. In addition, GPSS funds graduate and professional student groups which are not eligible for funding through the GSB student fees allocation process.

Beyond its funding responsibilities, GPSS is charged with the representation of graduate and professional student interests in policy-making decisions, both on and off campus. This representation requires that GSB and GPSS consult one another in the deliberation of issues that may affect the two constituencies differently. It is the responsibility of both institutions to establish and maintain communication with one another on such issues.

As a result of the organization and responsibilities of GPSS, its role is different than both GSB and a constituency council. Its special status within the overall structure of ISU student governance is one that complements, and is independent of, the governance structures of GSB and enhances the overall representation of student interests at ISU. In the interest of both the GSB and the GPSS, the following Articles of Cooperation shall serve as an outline of procedures for communication, funding, and representation.

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Graduate & Professional Student Senate

1. InterGovernmentCommunication i.

Executive Officers

a. The executives of GSB and the executives of GPSS, including, but not limited to, the President and Vice-president of each body, shall meet prior to the first meeting of the fall and spring semesters to review the goals of each body for that semester, and to discuss other items of mutual interest.

b. During at least one meeting of both the spring and fall semesters, the GSB and the GPSS Executive Officers shall address each other's legislative body concerning the activities, accomplishments and pertinent legislation of the past and upcoming academic years.

ii. Graduate Senators on GSB. Graduate senators seated on GSB serve on GPSS as senator at-large.

a. GSB elections. The graduate students will vote for GSB senators during the GSB elections that will serve as GSB senators and the GPSS senators at-large. The GSB election commissioner will notify the elected graduate senators and the GPSS Executive Council of the election results.

b. Vacant GSB Graduate Senators after election. If three GSB senators are not elected during the GSB elections, which occur while the general GPSS senate is not in session, the GPSS President will issue an executive order to temporary fill these vacancies. The GPSS Senate can ratify the executive order or select new graduate students to fill the vacancy during the first meeting of the GPSS Senate following the executive order.

iii. Minutes, Bills, and Resolution

The Secretary or Chief Information Officer of each body shall make available a copy of the approved minutes, bills, resolutions, and other pertinent correspondence to the Secretary or Chief Information Officer of the other body within one week of each meeting upon request.

2. Funding

i. Student Activity Fees

a. The GSB shall receive 50% and the GPSS shall receive 50% of the Student Activity Fees paid by graduate and professional students.

ii. Sponsored Events

a. Jointly funded events shall be sponsored whenever appropriate. All appropriate

1 publicity shall equally display the GSB and the GPSS logos, and the words “funded
2 by GSB and GPSS” shall appear on all appropriate publicity material.

3

4 3. Representation

5 i. The president of GSB and treasurer of GPSS shall each appoint a voting representative
6 to serve on each other’s Finance Committee.

7 ii. In committees overseeing issues of importance to both GSB and GPSS, representatives of
8 both bodies should be present.

9 iii. The GPSS University Relations and Legislative Affairs chair or a designated
10 appointee, shall serve as a voting member on the GSB University Affairs Committee.

11

12 4. Supremacy

13 The Articles of Cooperation shall supersede the By-laws of GSB and GPSS.

14

15 5. Amendments

16 Amendments to the Articles of Cooperation shall take effect after 2/3 of seated senators
17 in each legislative body approve the amendments, which must be presented in written
18 bills, the body text of which is the same in both bills.

19

20 6. Ratification

21 Ratification of the Articles of Cooperation shall require a 2/3 vote of seated senators of
22 each legislative body and shall take effect immediately upon passage.

SENATE BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. PROCEDURES OF THE SENATE

1. Elections. The Chief Information Officer shall:

i. Call for Senator elections by the respective department, interdepartmental, and professional program no later than November 1 and March 1 for seating of the following term.

ii. Calculate the number of representatives allotted to each department according to the rules given in the Constitution and based upon the enrollment of graduate and eligible professional students for each department, interdepartmental, and professional program given by the University Registrar for the immediately previous fall semester. Any information used in this calculation must be made available to any interested parties upon request.

iii. Be responsible for disseminating information of the number of Senators and time of election to all graduate and eligible professional students.

iv. Investigate all complaints concerning elections which were registered by the last day of March. Each department, interdepartmental, or professional program will be responsible for their own elections, but is subject to review by the Elections Committee in response to complaints.

v. See that elections are completed and verified no later than two weeks prior to the beginning of the spring term and August 1 for spring and fall terms respectively. An election is considered verified upon receipt of the proper verification form in the Graduate and Professional Student Senate Office.

vi. Be notified of any special elections held by departments.

2. Meeting rules

i. Unless otherwise specified, meetings of the Senate shall operate in compliance with the GPSS Constitution, the GPSS By-laws, Robert'sRulesofOrder, and the GPSS Standing Rules.

ii. In the event of the Vice-President's absence the presiding officer for the Senate session will be appointed by the President (or officer with the highest seniority) and is subject to a majority vote of the Senators in attendance.

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- 1 iii. A quorum shall consist of a majority of elected and verified Senators unless otherwise
2 stipulated in the Constitution or By-laws. A quorum during the summer sessions shall
3 consist of 35% of the elected and verified Senators.
4
- 5 iv. No motion may be made nor a vote be binding unless a quorum is present with the
6 exceptions of the motions to adjourn, fix a time to which to adjourn, recess, or modify the
7 agenda.
8
- 9 v. The agenda for a session of the Senate shall be prepared and distributed no later than one
10 week before the session. The agenda shall enumerate items to be discussed under old and
11 new business. Copies of bills and resolutions to be considered will be appended to the
12 agenda. The agenda may be amended at the beginning of the meeting by a majority vote
13 of the Senate.

- 15 vi. The order of business shall be:

 - 18 c. Statement of a Quorum by the Vice-President
 - 19 d. Approval of Minutes
 - 20 e. Amendments to the agenda

 - 23 h. Introduction of New Bills
 - 24 i. President's Remarks
 - 25 j. Rules Committee report
 - 26 k. Finance Committee report
 - 27 l. Elections Committee report
 - 28 m. University Relations and Legislative Affairs Committee report
 - 29 n. Professional Advancement Committee report
 - 30 o. Graduate GSB Senator report
 - 31 p. Old Business
 - 32 q. New Business
 - 33 r. Announcements
 - 34 s. Adjournment

- 36 vii. The Open Forum and the Senate Forum shall follow normal Graduate and Professional
37 Student Senate procedures with discussion directed from the chair, who will recognize

- 8 a. The primary beneficiaries of funding requested through special allocations must be
9 graduate and/or professional students.
10 b. Funding requests that are eligible for regular allocations, but are not submitted by
11 the deadline should not be accepted for special allocations funding except for
12 unforeseen expenditures.
13 c. It is the responsibility of the recipient receiving GPSS funding to communicate to
14 the Treasurer on how the money was spend and the treasure will report back to the
15 Senate.

18 5. Delinquency, Resignation and Removal of Senators

20 i. Senators are required to attend all Senate meetings.

- 21 a. Attendance is required from the beginning of Statement of Quorum through the end
22 of adjournment. If a Senator is not present during this entire time, he or she may be
23 counted absent unless prior arrangements have been made with the chair of the
24 meeting. If a Senator must leave the meeting early, the Senator must notify the CIO
25 and provide a reason before leaving the room.
26 b. Two absences, without a substitute, from regular meetings shall warrant notification
27 by the Elections Committee to the Senator in question, stating the rules of attendance
28 and delinquency.
29 c. Missing three regular meetings without a substitute during the entire academic year
30 constitutes resignation.
31 d. A substitute should be a graduate or professional student in the same department,
32 interdepartmental, or professional program who is able to relay information back to the
33 Senator's program.

35 iii. Removal of a Senator from the Senate for misconduct or nonfeasance shall be carried
36 out by a roll call vote requiring a two-thirds vote for approval. A resolution for removal
37 may be brought to the floor only if it is in written form.

3 i. Election Procedures. The Chairperson of the Elections Committee shall chair any election
4 unless he or she is running for that position, in which case he or she shall delegate the
5 chair during that election to a member of the Elections Committee not running for that
6 position or to an appropriate GPSS member. Nominations for each position shall be
7 closed immediately preceding the elections for that position by a majority vote of the
8 Senate. Executive Council members shall be elected by a majority. A run-off election will
9 be held between the persons receiving the two highest vote totals should a majority fail to

24 iv. Vacancies. Vacancies resulting from impeachment, resignation, or other causes shall
25 be filled by a special election conducted by the Elections Committee.

30 be chosen in the order of seniority. The Council cannot conduct business unless four of the
31 six members are present.

33 3. Delinquency, Resignation, Impeachment and Removal of Executive Officers.

35 i. An Executive Officer will be allowed one excused absence from meetings due to
36 professional or personal conflicts providing they secure another officer to relay any
37 committee reports and additional communication at Executive Council meetings or
38 regular meetings of the Senate.

40 ii. Two absences from either GPSS Executive Council or regular Senate meetings that are

1 not excused shall warrant notification by the Elections Committee stating the rules of
2 attendance and delinquency. Missing more than one meeting per semester without an
3 excused absence constitutes a resignation from the executive board position. The
4 Chief Information Officer will advise the election committee of the need for a special

7 iii. Executive Council members may be impeached by a written presentation of charges, in
8 the form of a senate order, sponsored by a minimum of 25% of the seated Senate. A vote
9 to recall an impeached Executive Council member from office must be approved by
10 two-thirds of a 60% quorum Senate.

- 16 1. Ad hoc committees may be formed by the Senate to carry out duties assigned to them by the
17 Senate. The powers of the committee will be clearly defined by the Senate.

- 19 2. The Chairperson of the committee appoints the members. Committee members must be
20 graduate or professional students. Committees, other than those defined by the Constitution,
21 may not have less than three members.

- 23 3. Committees, other than those defined by the Constitution, shall be dissolved after two years
24 unless re-formed by the Senate.

27 The Senate and all of its organized bodies, through its officers, shall follow the rules and
