Country beats Kiwis

at Seiffert

FEW N.Z. MEN IMPRESSED

The NSW Combined Country rugby league team gave the New Zealand tourists a very unhappy start to their Australian tour by inflicting a convincing 26-10 defeat on them at Seiffert Oval, Queanbeyan, yesterday.

NSW Country outclassed their more famous counterparts in every department, running faster and more directly, tackling more efficiently and never allowing the Kiwis to get into their stride.

Few of the New Zealanders came out of the game with any credit. Only Ken Stirling, Dennis Williams and Robert Orchard showed any real zest for the game. The rest were flat-footed, slow and generally out of touch.

In contrast the NSW team produced several stars. The man of the match was the lock Rod Urquhart who played his heart out. He never stopped tackling, featured in a number of dazzling runs and capped it off with a great individual try.

Strong play by Bourke

Another player who was always in the thick of it was Brian Bourke, the Queanbeyan United second-rower. His tackling was fast and effective and despite a number of brushes with the opposition he was still going strong at the end of the game.

For most of the second half he played covered in blood from a cut on the forehead after yet another clash with an opponent.

After the game he had eight stitches inserted in a huge gash.

Referee Bruce Chapman was sent flying during a scuffle as he left the field after the game. A brawl broke out among the players and lasted for

several minutes. It was just one of several such incidents which spoiled the game.

The hookers rarely touched the ball in the scrums for it never reached them. Terry Welsh of Queanbeyan made up for this lack of ball by constantly and successfully standing up during play-the-balls.

One of the most exciting players was big front-rower Greg Fearnley of Cowra. His bustling runs shook up more than a few Kiwis in the first half and forced the visitors to set two and often three men on to him every time he got the ball.

Limped off the field

After only a few minutes of play Des Milson, the second-rower from Coonabarabran, limped off the field with a leg injury and Wayne Hetherington replaced him.

The first points went on the board on a penalty kicked by Brian Burke the half-back from Maitland. Referee Chapman showed from the start that he was going to penalise any infringement and penalties flowed thick and fast.

Unfortunately, later in the game many infringements, particularly by NSW, were allowed to pass.

A second penalty awarded when Mr Chapman penalised Dennis Williams for punching, gave NSW Country another two points.

In the early stages of the game the Kiwis were pinned in their own half with NSW Country tackling hard and fast.

The visitors failed to tackle cleanly and NSW Country found great gaps in the Kiwis' defence. But

start when he took the ball from a play-the-ball and ran through to score. Warren Collicot converted.

Once again the New Zealand defence was found wanting when Wayne Hetherington scored a great individual try. He collected the ball 30 yards out, ran diagonally through two tackles and went over near the corner.

For once Burke failed with his kick. The New Zealanders then missed out on two points when Collicot missed a penalty but soon afterwards he made amends with another penalty to make the score 19-10. But those were to be the last points for the Kiwis.

Fine passing movement

A fine passing movement brought another try for NSW Country. Half-back Burke sent the ball to Dorahy who in turn passed to Kennedy.

He ran between two defenders to score easily and Burke converted. Shortly afterwards the scoring ended with another penalty by Burke, whose kicking was accurate all day. He was another NSW Country player who could feel pleased with his performance for his handling of the ball was good, he ran well and tackled strongly.

The game was marred by too much over-rough play and the Kiwis could hardly have been satisfied with their performance with an important Test match on Saturday.

The people who gained most heart from the result were a number of Australian Test players who travelled to Queanbeyan to watch the game.

Stewards ban Renzella for life

MELBOURNE, Tuesday. — Casterton Racing Club stewards disqualified racehorse owner Mr Rick Renzella for life today.

They found Mr Renzella, 26, guilty on each of four charges in the Royal School inquiry.

The stewards also disqualified Royal School's trainer, Ross Afflick, 30, for life.

Jockey Steven Wood, 22, was disqualified for 20 years.

Float driver Mr Gary Canavan, 22, was disqualified for 10 years.

The charges alleged that

a horse which ran and won at Casterton on May 12 under the name of Royal School was not the Royal School's.

Mr Renzella, Afflick, Wood and Mr Canavan all said later they would appeal.

Disqualified people are banned from entering a racecourse, stables of any trainer, or visiting any training track where racehorses are prepared. This applies in all States and in New Zealand.

The stewards concluded today the inquiry into the bona fides of the horse which won the Muntham Handicap at Casterton on May 12.

The stewards disqualified Royal School for life also and from the Muntham Handicap.

The amended placings in the race are: Apex Star first, Coudawn second, Ticasco third, and Brandy Stream fourth.

Mr Renzella will be notified in writing of the stewards' finding.

Disqualified on four charges

The stewards found that Mr Renzella, a car dealer of the Melbourne suburb of Elwood, guilty as charged and disqualified him for life on each charge.

They found Wood guilty on each charge and disqualified him for 20 years on a charge of improper practice, 20 years on a charge of "conspiring with Mr R. Renzella, Mr R. Afflick and G. Canavan or some other persons unknown to commit a malpractice", and two years on the charge of misconduct in that he gave false evidence.

The penalties are to be served concurrently. The stewards found Mr Canavan guilty as charged and disqualified him for 10 years on the charge of conspiring with Mr Renzella, Mr Afflick and Mr Wood or some other persons unknown to commit a malpractice, for two

GOOLAGONG, EVERT TO MEET IN SEMI-FINAL

LONDON, Tuesday (AAP). — A semi-final clash between Wimbledon champion Evonne Goolagong and young American tennis sensation Chris Evert became a reality yesterday when both defeated their quarter-final opponents.

However both had anxious moments on the way. Miss Goolagong again had to draw on her fighting tennis reserves to overcome eight-seed French number-one Miss Francoise Durr 6-6 7-5 while Miss Evert dropped the second set in her match against compatriot Patti Hogan 6-2 4-6 6-1.

The long awaited Goolagong-Evert semi-final will take place on Wednesday, on the Wimbledon centre court.

The match is expected to be the highlight of the 1972 championships.

In another quarter final yesterday Miss Rosemary Casals defeated Mrs Nancy Richey Gunter, both from the US, 3-6 6-4 6-0, while on the centre court Mrs Billie Jean King had a shaky time against Britain's powerful and determined Virginia Wade.

The top-favoured American came home the winner 6-1 3-6 6-3.

Australia's last Wimbledon men's singles hope Colin Dibley was in fine fettle last night on the eve of his quarter-final match with Spaniard Manuel Orantes.

Playing in a mixed doubles match with Karen Krantzcke, Dibley served with the accuracy and power which has been the hallmark of his success here.

Australian veteran Neale Fraser, who helped develop the Dibley serve, shook his head in exasperation as he and his partner Virginia Wade struggled to return Dibley's service games.

Dibley and Krantzcke won 6-4, 6-1.

Dibley also reached the quarter-finals here last year, but was then de-

molished in straight sets by the eventual winner John Newcombe.

His chances of reaching the semi-finals this year are much better.

LONDON, Tuesday (AAP). — Big queues were building up for the men's quarter finals at Wimbledon today, the Press Association reported.

At 6am (4pm AEST) more than 300 people were waiting under an ominously cloudy sky outside the All England Club.

Play in the tournament was due to begin on schedule at 2pm (11pm AEST) today.

A former ACT squash player who now lives in Alice Springs Mrs Nigel Barkham, will attempt to break the women's world marathon squash record in Alice Springs next Saturday.

Mrs Barkham and a partner, Mrs Lyn McKew, will attempt to play squash for 24 hours. The record is 16 hours.

Mrs Barkham lived in the ACT for about six years before moving with her husband to Northern Territory earlier this year.

The marathon attempt is being made under the sponsorship of the Alice Springs Squash Racquets Association in an attempt to promote squash in the town.

The association wants to raise money to run the inter-city squash tournament between Alice Springs, Mt Isa and Darwin next Easter and also to promote juniors in the local competition.

Record in sight

LONDON, Tuesday (AAP). — An American-designed yacht sailed by France's Jean Yves Terlain surged towards a new world record for a solo crossing of the Atlantic today in the Sunday Observer singlehanded trans-Atlantic yacht race, United Press International reported.

A race spokesman said Terlain's 128-foot schooner Vendredid 13 (Friday the 13th) could reach the finish line at Newport, Rhode Island, by the weekend, only 20 days after setting out from Plymouth, England.

This would shave six days off the record set in the same race in 1968 by Geoffrey Williamson in the 56-foot ketch Sir Thomas Lipton.

Graham beats Devlin in play-off

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Tuesday (AAP). — Australian David Graham, 26, a newcomer on the US professional tour, sank an 8ft putt for a birdie on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff yesterday and won the \$151,000 (about SA126,000) Cleveland open golf championship, the Associated Press reported.

Graham had finished the regulation 72 holes of the rain-delayed tournament tied with fellow Australian Bruce Devlin at 278, six under par on the Tanglewood Country Club course.

Devlin twice missed putts that would have given him victory, a six-footer on the 72nd and a three-footer on the first playoff hole.

He and Graham, World Cup partners last year, set out in the mist and fading sunlight for the playoff for the \$US30,000 (about SA25,200) first prize.

On the first sudden death hole, Graham drove into a fairway bunker, blasted out, chipped up and two putted for a bogey five. Devlin was on the green in two but three-putted for a bogey. He missed a three-foot putt that would have given him victory.

Until the US Open two weeks ago, he had not won enough money on the tour to rank in the top 100. But his pay cheque yesterday will put him into the top 40.

No secret

MELBOURNE, Tuesday. — The pennant soccer match between JUST and Croatia which the Victorian Soccer Federation ordered played behind locked gates at a secret venue, will be played before the public at Olympic Park tomorrow night.

The locked gates ruling, including a rider to the effect that the game would be played on 24 hours' notice at a secret venue, was rescinded when no suitable venue could be found.

Laggan youth's honours

GOULBURN, Tuesday. — A 17-year-old youth from Laggan, near Crookwell, has gained a treble honour in men's State hockey.

Seventeen-year-old Larry McIntosh has been selected for the State under-18 hockey squad, as a member of the State colts' hockey team and as a player for the senior men's State hockey team.

Larry is one of 25 (11 of whom come from Goulburn and Crookwell) selected for the State under-18 squad to spend one week in group hockey training in Sydney in August.

He will leave for Melbourne on July 23 to spend 10 days playing with the State colts' team in the Australian hockey championships.

Next year he will be off to New Zealand for a tour with the senior men's State hockey team. Larry turned 17 last Friday.
